The Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College (MGCCC) Foundation was incorporated in July 1974 as a 501c (3), not-for-profit corporation. The charter of incorporation determined that the Board of Directors would be comprised of 22 members, chosen as follows: three by the Alumni Association; three by the college Board of Trustees; 14 elected from donor members; two college staff members by the college president; the college president (serves as executive secretary); and the district president of the Alumni Association (honorary).

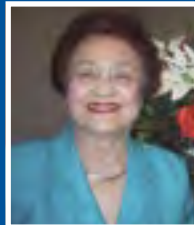

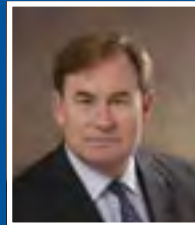

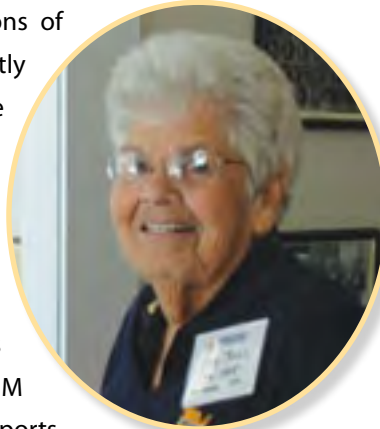
PLANNED GIVING

MATCHING GIFTS

When Harrell Mallett's four children asked what he wanted for Father's Day 10 years ago, he replied that he had plenty of socks and ties and wanted something different. He requested a check from each child to establish the Harrall and Tillie Mallett Family Scholarship at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College.

"I had always wanted to establish an endowed scholarship at Gulf Coast," Mallett said. "I told them that if they each gave me a little check, I'd match the amount." His matching funds brought the first year's total to \$500, an amount

then matched by Chevron Refinery Pascagoula, where he worked until his retirement in 1996. "It was a small amount, but we have added to it over the years," he said. "It is something we are all very proud of accomplishing."

Mallett credits former college Board of Trustee member Dr. Frank Gruich with encouraging him to establish the scholarship. "I told him that I wanted to start a scholarship but felt I didn't have enough money. He told me it didn't matter how much I had to get started, that it was a worthy endeavor."

Two to six students received scholarships annually from the fund. Recipients must attend the Perkinson Campus, where Mallett, three of his children and one of his grandchildren attended school. "Our family recognizes the benefits of MGCCC, and we know it offers an excellent opportunity for initial independence, affordability and quality education following high school." He added, "As demonstrated by my family and children, of whom I am very proud, the opportunity of education and success is right here at your doorstep if you will apply yourself and pursue your dream."

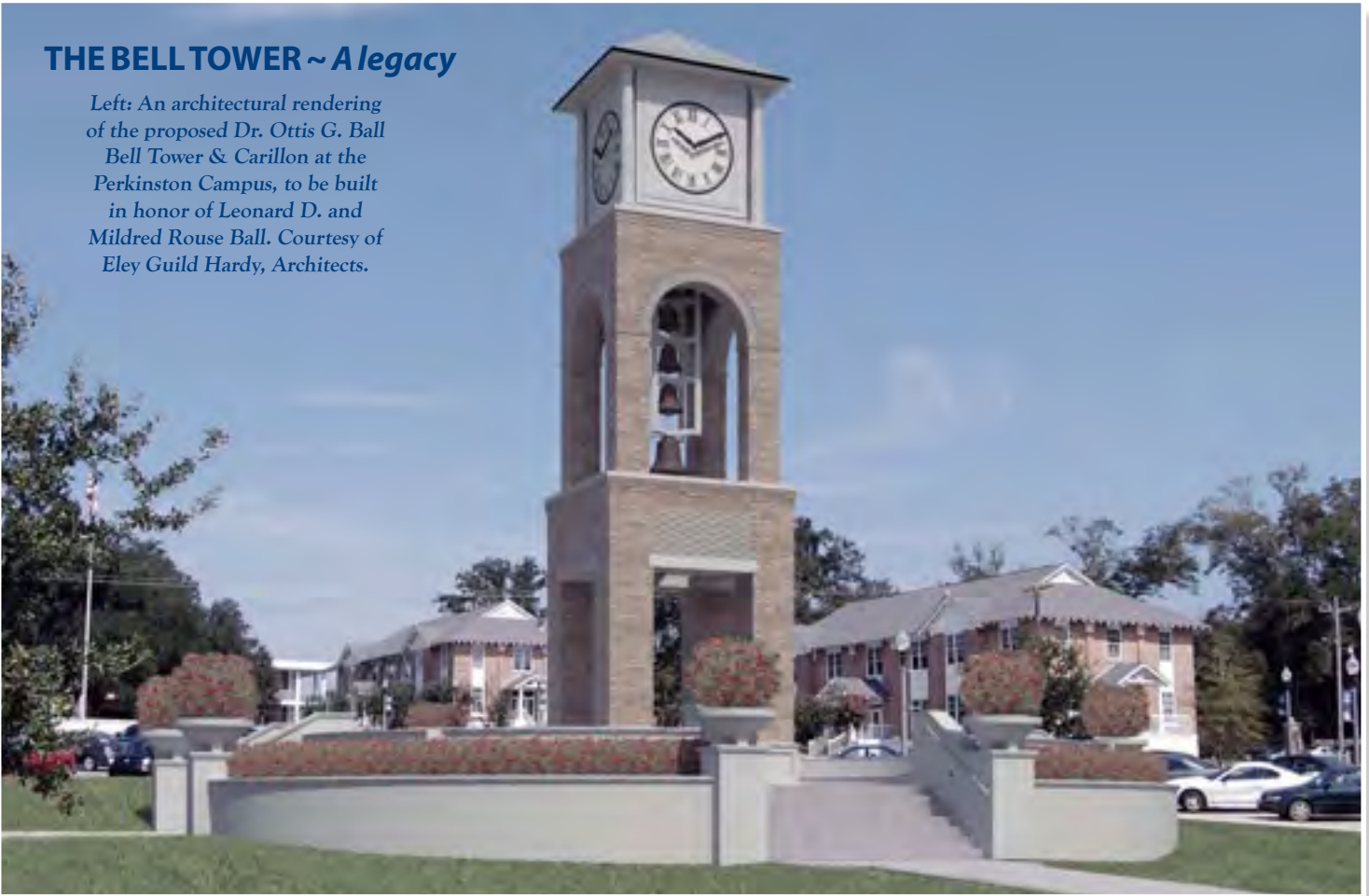

In 2008, Dr. Ottis G. Ball of Jackson pledged \$1 million to the MGCCC Foundation, its largest monetary gift. The funds established the Dr. Ottis G. Ball Medical Scholarship Fund and will provide for the construction of the Dr. Ottis G. Ball Bell Tower and Carillon at the Perkinston Campus, to be built in honor of Leonard D. and Mildred Rouse Ball.

Ball, author of "Along Came Frog" and more than 40 scientific articles, says his pledge was a way to "pay it forward." "My time at Perk equipped me very well for The University of Mississippi (UMC) Medical School in Jackson. I wanted to give that opportunity to other students," he says.

Recipients of the scholarship, which will be available in fall 2011, will receive \$5,000 annually and must demonstrate the highest potential for success at the end of the first year to continue the scholarship for the second year. They must be enrolled in pre-medical, pre-nursing, physical therapy, therapeutic radiology, digestive radiology, pre-pharmacy, pre-medicinal dietary, pre-respiratory therapy, pre-dental or pre-occupational therapy.



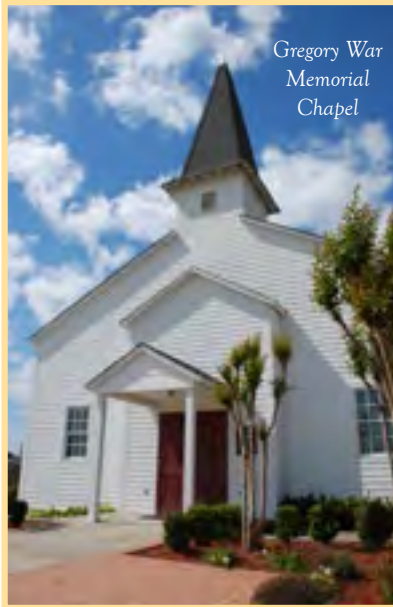
Dr. Ottis Ball

Ball, boarded in radiology and nuclear medicine, retired in 2010 as professor of Radiology and director of the Department of Nuclear Medicine at UMC, where he worked for five and a half years. He was director of Nuclear Medicine at Mississippi Baptist Medical Center in Jackson for 32 years, and worked for three and a half years at St. Dominic Hospital, also in Jackson.

Ball attended and lived on campus at Perkinston Agricultural High School his junior and senior years (1950-52) and Perkinston Junior College (1952-53). While at Perk, he was encouraged by instructors Susie Cooley, Robert F. "Col. Bob" Rivers and Dr. K.P. Faust, and J.V. Wentzell, the high-school principal. In 1955, he was a member of the first freshman class at the UMC School of Medicine in Jackson. In 2008, he received the Sam Owen Award from Gulf Coast.

Ball and his wife, Dixie, have been married for 52 years. They have three sons and 13 grandchildren and reside in Jackson.

More than 60 years ago, the citizens of this community celebrated the end of World War II. As families returned to normal, Perkinston Junior College reflected on the sacrifices made by alumni, friends, faculty and students. In 1947 a U.S. Army chapel was purchased from Gulfport Field and dedicated as the War Memorial Chapel on March 6, 1949. On April 20, 1960, the

college Board of Trustees ordered the structure renamed Gregory Chapel in honor of the WW II-era mathematics instructor, William G. Gregory, who spearheaded the fundraising effort to purchase it. At Homecoming 1995, the Alumni Association merged the two former names into Gregory War Memorial Chapel. The chapel has held a special place in the life of Perkinston Campus as the hub of activities for student religious organizations. In addition, it has served as the site of marriages, funerals and special memorials. The totally renovated chapel, complete with the Walk of Honor, was dedicated on Homecoming day, October 27, 2001. These endowed scholarships will be awarded from the earned interest of the fund. The donor(s) executes a document with the Foundation outlining the criteria for the selection of scholarship recipients.

One may also choose to contribute to the General Memorial Fund in memory of a friend or loved one. While this fund is not an endowment, the General Memorial Fund is an easy way to recognize the importance of the person and also helps students by providing scholarships.

BE THE DIFFERENCE ~ Providing student scholarships

Many scholarships have been established by donors who have recognized a need in a particular area. Other scholarships, like those created by the county Alumni Association chapters, are established by groups of people who want to help students in their communities attend college. Most Alumni Association members agree that they had a great experience at Gulf Coast, and, they want to give that same opportunity to prospective and/or current students. Students benefit from the scholarships because these funds can often address needs not covered by financial aid. Student scholarships may be established with specific criteria designating the college location, area of study and/or student activity.

IMPACT...

Alumni and friends of the college continue to provide financial assistance to students. However, total donations received by the Foundation decreased 11 percent from the prior year.

IMPACT...

Total Foundation assets increased from \$3,837,693 in the year 2001 to \$6,496,817 in 2010. Increasing Foundation assets provides the basis for increasing student scholarships.

MGCCC/Hope Haven Partners in Transition Program

More than 4,000 children are in the custody of the state in Mississippi, with almost 200 of those turning 18 and “aging out of the system,” often leaving them with no place to go when they leave their foster home or group home. These students do not have job skills or parents and family to give them support. The Partners in Transition Program, a scholarship established in 2009, is designed to help address this problem by offering these young adults an opportunity to enroll in a one- or two-year program at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College.

The college assists the new students with obtaining Pell Grants and other subsidies for which they are eligible. Participants in the program enjoy the many benefits the college has to offer, including referrals and job placement upon completion of their studies or when they transfer to a four-year institution. Hope Haven provides additional funds through scholarships (largely derived from an annual Charity Golf Tournament held in conjunction with Gulf Coast) to provide each student with funds to meet their supplementary needs.

“We are incredibly proud of what we have accomplished with this program,” Hope Haven Executive Director Terry Latham said. “The scholarships we give each year offer these students direction, a safe environment in which to live and the opportunity to be around other people motivated to get their education. They also have access to counselors and personnel who can help them decide what they want to do in life.”

“Without the opportunity and the scholarship, my plan would be difficult for me to accomplish,” said Donald Reyer, one of the first recipients of the scholarship, who plans to pursue a chemical engineering degree.

ANNUAL FUND DRIVE

Each year the college conducts an Annual Fund drive. Funds may be designated for scholarships or a particular purpose. Those funds used for general scholarships may be noted as “unrestricted scholarships.” Unrestricted scholarship contributions assist in meeting the needs of students who do not qualify for federal tuition assistance or meet the requirements for academic scholarships. Year-end contributions to the MGCCC Foundation are tax deductible.

ENDOWED AND NON-ENDOWED RESTRICTED FUNDS

Endowed Restricted Funds typically are established by a one-time gift, and only the interest or earnings can be used. For example, a retired individual may make a gift of \$100,000 in his/her will for the purposes of campus improvements or to improve a particular instructional program. Specific names of existing endowed restricted funds include Frantzen Building Fund, Institutional Advancement Fund, Leadership Fund, Thomas Leatherbury Fund, Manis Estuarine Education Center Fund and Staff Development Fund.

Non-endowed Restricted Funds are established for the purpose of receiving donations annually for a particular function. They are named by function and are used to assist the college in such areas as supplies and/or equipment. Examples of non-endowed restricted funds include Alumni House Furniture Fund, Archives Fund, Band Fund, Baseball Fund, Women's Basketball Fund, Men's Basketball Fund, Chapel Fund, Festival of Lights Fund, Field House Fund, Football Fund, Football Cheerleaders Fund, General Athletic Fund, Golf Fund, Lineman Training Fund, Metal Roofing Alliance Fund, New Harmonies Exhibit Fund, Careers in Technology Conference Fund, Tennis Fund and Gulf Coast Youth Leadership Fund.

ENDOWED AND OUTSIDE PRIVATE SCHOLARSHPS

Endowed Scholarships have been established by a gift that is invested and whereby only the earnings from the investment can be used for scholarships. For the most part, these are restricted and are usually given in memory of family members.

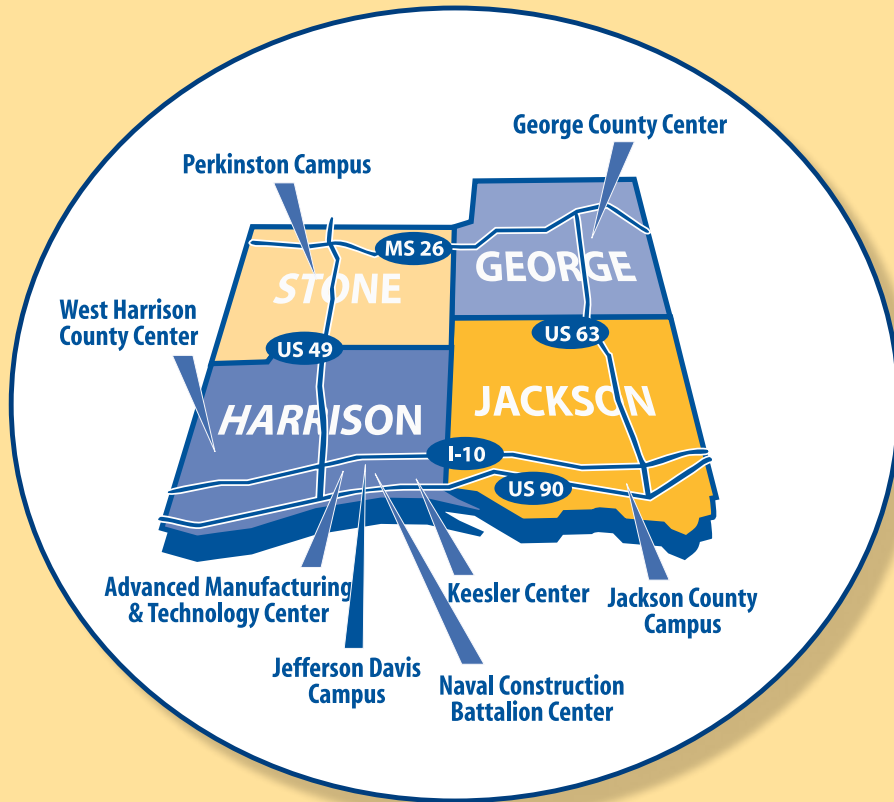
